



















WIFIA (WATER INFRASTRUCTURE FINANCE AND INNOVATION ACT)

- EPA makes WIFIA funding available annually and invites Letters of Interest
- Selected projects are then invited to apply
- Credit subsidy offered by WIFIA guarantees a loan at the AAA Treasury rate (even if borrower has a lower (or no) credit rating)
- Loan term is 35 years from substantial completion, and repayment can be deferred up to 5 years after substantial completion (i.e., total of 40 years)
- WIFIA funding can be up to 49% of the project cost, and total Federal funding can be up to 80% of the project cost
- Minimum project size for large communities is \$20m, and for small communities (25,000 or less) is \$5m

WIIN 2104 SUDC

- Annual grant funding for States and Tribes
- Must be a Small (serving a population < 10,000), Underserved (DW compliance violation within last 5 years), Disadvantaged (per each state's DAC criteria) Community</p>
- For drinking water infrastructure projects and/or technical assistance to comply with SDWA
- Administered by Washington DOH
- FY21 funding amount for Washington was \$758,000

WIIN 2107 LEAD TESTING AND REDUCTION IN SCHOOLS AND CHILDCARE FACILITIES

- Annual grant funding for States and Tribes
- Three rounds of funding offered to date.
- Uses EPA's 3Ts for Reducing Lead in Drinking Water guidance to implement lead testing programs and develop monitoring, maintenance and/or sampling plans that protect children from lead exposure.
- BIL modified program to allow <u>compliance monitoring and reduction/remediation</u> in addition to testing.
- Most recent WIIN 2107 grant to Washington = \$723,000

- EPA HQ makes funding available annually and uses a competitive RFA process.
- \$20m available nationally for FY22
- Funding is for projects or activities to replace lead service lines, implement treatment improvement projects, and remove potential sources of lead in schools and childcare facilities across the United States.

EC-SDC (EMERGING CONTAMINANTS IN SMALL AND DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES)

- EPA will make funding available annually and invite Letters of Intent
- States can then apply for their share of the national EC-SDC allotment
- Funding is for projects and/or technical assistance to help small and disadvantaged communities address emerging contaminants, like PFAS.
- \$1B per year for 5 years.
- 100% grant, no match.

SEWER OVERFLOW AND STORMWATER REUSE MUNICIPAL GRANTS (OSG) PROGRAM

- Annual grant funding for States and Tribes
- One round of funding offered to date.
- States are required to prioritize funding projects for communities that are financially distressed, have a long-term municipal CSO or SSO control plan, or for projects that have requested funding on their Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) Intended Use Plan.
- FY21 OSG funds for Washington = \$1,241,000

COMMUNITY GRANTS, AKA CONGRESSIONALLY DIRECTED SPENDING OR COMMUNITY PROJECT FUNDING, OR EARMARKS

- Earmarks program was mothballed in 2011 now back in 2022
- Annual grant funding for specific water infrastructure projects
- Generally same eligibilities as SRF
- 20% match
- Administered by EPA, but request funding via member of Congress
- FY22 Community Grant funding for projects in Washington = \$32m for 17 projects

- Provide historic levels of funding to address the gap between water infrastructure needs and available funds

The <u>American Iron and Steel (AIS)</u> provision requires recipients to procure and use iron and steel products that are produced in the United States for the construction, alteration, maintenance, or repair of a public water system or treatment works.

FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS: BUILD AMERICA, BUY AMERICA (BABA)



Build America, Buy America (BABA) requires all of the iron, steel, manufactured products, and construction materials used in a Federally-funded project to be produced in the United States.

All EPA Grant programs	Draft De Minimis Waiver	Products that qualify for a de minimis waiver cumulatively may comprise no more than a total of <u>5</u> <u>percent of the total cost of the materials</u> used in and incorporated into a project.

*An additional waiver for the Community Grants program is being discussed – it would be similar to the waiver for the SRF program.



FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS: DAVIS-BACON ACT

The <u>Davis-Bacon Act (DBA)</u> requires that all contractors and subcontractors performing construction, alteration, and repair (including painting and decorating) work under federal contracts in excess of \$2,000, pay their laborers and mechanics not less than the prevailing wage and fringe benefits for the geographic location.

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


FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS: ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW (NEPA OR SERP)



This requirement means looking at how federal grant actions may affect the quality of the environment. The direct grant programs require NEPA, and projects receiving SRF funding follow a NEPA-like State Environmental Review Process (SERP). More info:

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FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS: DBE

Under EPA's DBE Program recipients who procure goods and services with Federal funds are required to seek and are encouraged to use disadvantaged business enterprises (DBEs).

- Key components of the <u>Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBE</u>) <u>Program</u> include:
 - Fair Share Objectives,
 - Six Good Faith Efforts,
 - DBE (MBE/WBE) Reporting, and
 - DBE (MBE/WBE) Certification.
- Grant recipients must report DBE participation on EPA Form 5700-52A, when the budget for procuring construction, equipment, services, supplies, and subawards (under 'Other') exceeds \$250,000 (Simplified Acquisition Threshold).

FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS: 2 CFR PART 200, SUBPART F (SINGLE AUDIT)



A non-Federal entity that expends \$750,000 or more in Federal grants during the non-Federal entity's fiscal year must have a single or programspecific audit conducted for that year.

Key takeaways:

- Based on expenditure of funds, not receipt of a grant award
- Triggered when funds are disbursed by EPA
- Includes Federal funds from any source or Agency
